Being Fair To Other Preachers

Seven rules about counseling someone from another church.

How to Chose What Advice to Give

Sort through the information gathered from the counselee; categorize it, and then decide how to advise the person. This chapter gives some guidelines to help you decide what counsel you will give them.

1.	If there is a Bible principle involved, let the Bible principle make the decision. Let dogmatic Bible statements of right and wrong make the decision for you. Ref
2.	Let Bible examples help make the proper decision.
	If there is no dogmatic Scripture reference on a question, then use Bible examples to show them that someone suffered a negative result from doing what they are about to do. Ref.
3.	Letting life-learned principles make our decisions is taught in the Bible.
	If the answer has been "no" 99 out of 100 times, then the advise to give is "no" every time.
	Ref
4.	If no Bible principle nor example can be found, ask God to control your mind.
	Have hope and bathe it in prayer that God will give you the answer. Ref.
5.	When you give advice, be honest about your degree of certainty.
	If you are certain about your advice, say so. If you are uncertain, tell them you need time
	to pray about it or that you need to get a second opinion. Ref
	The only time you can state for sure that something is absolutely right or wrong is if you
	can find it in the Bible. If it's not in the Bible then you cannot be 100% sure that its right
	or wrong. Be honest about your degree of certainty.
